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COMMITTEE REPORT

HCS Management Committee Report May 2024

The Harrogate Choral Society (HCS) Management Committee met on May 9, 2024, to discuss various organisational and operational matters. Key agenda items included the approval of previous meeting minutes, declarations of interest, and an executive update.

The executive update addressed issues like the delay in finalising accounts due to QuickBooks complications, venue considerations for upcoming concerts, and a problem with a hired piano at our March 2024 concert that has been the subject of discussions as to compensation with the hirer.

Impending policy updates were also highlighted, with a focus on updating the Equal Opportunities, Code of Conduct and Data Protection policies by the end of June 2024.

The action plan for 2023-24 was reviewed, noting the need for ticket prices for the June concert.

Contract renewals for key personnel were discussed, highlighting the contributions of our Music Director and Deputy Directors.

Financial discussions included membership fee proposals for the 2024-25 season to be shared at the upcoming AGM on Weds 3rd July 2024. Marketing and publicity efforts were noted to be increasingly reliant on social media, and sponsorship strategies were discussed.

The meeting also covered safeguarding, health and safety, and updates on the Beati choir and membership matters.

Future concert planning was also addressed, with discussions on repertoire and venue options given the current limitations of available concert halls.

The meeting finished with proposed dates for the committee to meet in 2024-2025.

CONCERT REVIEW

"Circlesong" concert 20 April 2024



A concert featuring Bob Chilcott's *Circlesong* and *Walking the Red Road* plus other performed by Scunthorpe Cooperative Junior Choir.

Both Chilcott works have links in the life of Native American peoples. *Circlesong* – the major work - presents a complete life cycle based on Native American writings. Each of the thirteen movements focuses on a different stage of life, from birth and childhood through manhood and middle age to death. *Walking the Red Road* takes its theme from the Indian Red Road which is a metaphor for living a spiritual way of life.

Harrogate Choral were joined by Backbeat Percussion, pianists Thomas Moore and Anthony Gray and the Scunthorpe Co-operative Junior Choir for a concert including energetic percussion accompaniment, climactic moments, tender unaccompanied passages and a variety of music!!

"The combination of the percussive excitement of Backbeat, the rich harmonies of the choir and the delicate finishing brushstrokes of the children's soaring voices in the glorious surroundings of St. Wilfrid's was exquisite and emotional. A feast of a concert.

The concert opened with Backbeat Percussion performing *Okavango* by Damien Harron, one of their players, then Harrogate Choral Society conducted by HCS Music Director David Lawrence sanf

Walking the Red Road by Bob Chilcott, followed by more Backbeat Percussion this time playing Damien Harron's Gear Train.

Then it was the turn of Scunthorpe Co-operative Junior Choir, Conducted by their Music Director Daniel Fields with Accompanist Lynn Robinson (and some support from Backbeat Percussion). Their set comprised Sing *Jubilate Deo* by Jerry Estes; *Our Voice* by Bob Chilcott which was a SCJC Centenary Commission from 2023; *Butterflies & Moths* from Andrew Carter's Benedicite; *Johnnie Cope* by Ken Johnstone' *Child of Tomorrow* by Mark Patterson; *Amani Utupe* by Patsy Ford Simms; *and finally Feel Good* by L. Craig Tyson and Leonard Scott.

After the interval all performers presented the title piece *Circlesong* by Bob Chilcott.

"We enjoyed a very memorable afternoon in St Wilfred's Church last Saturday and I feel it appropriate to say what a pleasure it was to attend. We have been to other choir performances before but none quite as enjoyable as a this. The afternoon started with Backbeat drums and then the nine choral offerings by the Scunthorpe Junior Choir in their 101st year. I noted that whatever they were singing there were no notes, no musical aide memoir so everything had to be learned by heart. I have no idea how many rehearsals the choir had with the Harrogate Choir but I suspect only one in the morning, but they were able to deliver a perfect result. The rest of the afternoon was devoted to a beautiful rendition of Bob Chilcott Circlesong with memorable performances by the two pianists and Backbeat drums. Overall, a performance worthy of a much larger audience in the Royal Hall for example and a performance that we will remember for a long time."

HCS SOPRANO'S WELCOME ANA FROM PORTUGAL



In 2011 I finally listened to my passion for singing and joined a choir called Ad Libitum in my hometown Coimbra, in Portugal. I remember vividly the first rehearsal. I sat in the small room where we rehearsed, after my audition where I had just found out I was a soprano, feeling a bit nervous while trying to learn my part in a piece we were singing and that I'd never heard before. The moment came to sing together with the other voice parts for the first time and when everyone started singing, I was paralysed! Suddenly the ensemble of all the voices coming together was

absolutely incredible and my brain was listening in awe! When I was finally able to join in, it felt a bit like something magical was happening right there. This was when I forged my passion for choir singing.

Ad Libitum was quite a small choir, we were about 10/15 people and our choir director or maestrina, Isilda Margarida, was really passionate about vocal training. We sang mostly sacred music and sang at a range of different venues and events such as churches, schools, weddings and would sometimes sing together with our children's choir Cherubini Ad Libitum. One of our biggest projects during the time I was in the choir was a piece by Portuguese composer Carlos Seixas at the Conservatoire of Coimbra, where we sang accompanied by a Harpsichord.




My life's path brought me to the UK in 2014 and becoming a mother led me to be so busy that I never searched for another choir until now.

I've been so well received at Harrogate Choral Society, everyone is so friendly and the rehearsals are filled with such a light and fun atmosphere making them the highlight of my week. This choir is much bigger than Ad Libitum, so the experience of singing has been quite different, but the power of so many voices singing together is absolutely astounding. I feel really fortunate to have joined them and I'm quite excited about our new Leonardo concert!

OUR NEXT TWO CONCERTS



In Leonardo Dreams of His Flying Machine composer Eric Whitacre and poet Charles Anthony Silvestri aim to conceptualize the sublime thoughts of renaissance genius Leonardo da Vinci, an artist but also a visionary whose mind conceived terrible engines of war such as tanks but also flying machines.

Vivaldi's Four Seasons is the best known of his works which were a revolution in musical conception.

The final work Cecilia MacDowell's Da Vinci Requiem resents an imaginative pairing of extracts from the notebooks of Leonardo da

Vinci with texts from the Latin Missa pro defunctis.

Harrogate Choral Society will be joined by soloists Sara Trickey, Violin; Eleonore Cockerham, Soprano and Gareth Brynmor John, Baritone. They will be accompanied by the National Festival Orchestra and conducted by the HCS's Music Director David Lawrence.

In November we return to St Wilfrid's for a concert featuring two works by Taylor Scott Davis – in *How can I keep from Singing* he frames a tune by Robert Lowry and moulds into a dialogue between the voice parts and the accompaniment. His *Magnificat* was premiered by VOCES8 and is a beautiful setting of the story of Mary from youth to being God's chosen one.

Two versions of Panis Angelicus and the increasingly well know Requiem by Matthew Coleridge complete the programme.

Harrogate Choral Society will once again be joined by the National Festival Orchestra and will be conducted by David Lawrence.
